

New era for White House

POPULAR Thame beauty clinic The White House, is celebrating its 20th anniversary in the town.

This month marks two decades of trading in the town, and owner, Amanda Supple, has celebrated the occasion by moving premises and re-launching as a multi-discipline holistic centre.

From the business' original location at East Street, which at one stage was a cheese shop, The White House is on the move to the Buttermarket.

Amanda said: "We had grown into an established and successful salon, but life changing events, like hitting 40, made me realise it was time to get the life-work balance back."

However, down sizing to the quirky old building above Top Sport wasn't without drama, as a major renovation project was necessary when the back of the building collapsed entirely.

The next six months saw the business shrouded in scaffolding, prompting rumours that The White House had closed altogether.

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But the clinic's new home continues the dairy theme at 13A Upper High Street, in a building called The Old Dairy, reflecting its past use and conversion in the 1960s.

Practising on the first floor, above chiropody clinic Feet First, Ms Supple, a beautician and aromatherapist, now oversees a strong team of independent,

freelance practitioners offering clients a wide range of health and beauty therapies.

A handful of other ad-hoc therapists also offer Indian head massage, holistic healing, reflexology and Balinese massage.
